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

This may include articles, stories that are relevant and important news in the lives of our parishioners.



As a community we have been supporting Graceway Village for over 3 years. We started serving 300 meals and as the need grew, we have been supplying 500 meals per month. During this time, we have enjoyed support from the board and the community with both time and treasure. At this point we had to shift to providing just the 500 chicken entrees monthly. However we are also in need of assistance in maintaining this worthwhile endeavor. For just a \$33.00 donation you can feed 40 people. That is .83 cents per person. We are in the final two weeks of Great Lent and then we experience Holy Week. When we attend the Presanctified Liturgy during Great Lent we see that we are already in a subdued mode of worship. The Altar coverings and the vestments are the penitential colors of the weekdays of Great Lent and Holy Week.

Palm Sunday we celebrate the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. He entered in humility as the crowd laid down palm branches and sang, "Hosanna, blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord."

Holy Unction is celebrated on Holy Wednesday because of our need for forgiveness and spiritual healing. At the conclusion of this service the faithful who are baptized or chrismated into the Orthodox faith are anointed with the Holy Unction.

Holy Thursday opens with a reminder of the shameful betrayal of Christ by Judas Iscariot. As the morning vesperal Divine Liturgy of Saint Basil begins, the thought of the betrayal still lingers, but is combined with readings and hymns which speak of the Mystical, or Last, Supper, and the institution of the Eucharist.

Holy Thursday evening, we hear Twelve Gospel accounts of the suffering and crucifixion of Christ, all of them contributing to the complete picture of the final events of His life among us. The atmosphere in the church is one of hushed sorrow and tragedy as the words of Pilate and the cries of the mob demanding Christ's death are recalled.

Holy Friday is a day of strict fast. In the evening the Lamentations service anticipates Jesus' resurrection.

Holy Saturday we hope and wait for the resurrection. We celebrate the vesperal Divine Liturgy in the morning and chant, "Arise O God and Judge the earth, for to Thee belong all the nations." Finally, at the midnight service, we celebrate our Lord's glorious Resurrection.

Please see the schedule for all of the Holy Week and Pascha services and join us for our Holy Week journey to our Lord's glorious resurrection!


The first to apologize is the bravest. The first to forgive is the strongest. And the first to forget is the happiest...

According to an ancient tradition, it is said that Lazarus was thirty years old when the Lord raised him; then he lived another thirty years on Cyprus and there reposed in the Lord. It is furthermore related that after he was raised from the dead, he never laughed till the end of his life, but that once only, when he saw someone stealing a clay vessel, he smiled and said, "Clay stealing clay." His grave is situated in the city of Kition, having the inscription: "Lazarus the four days dead and friend of Christ." In 890 his sacred relics were transferred to Constantinople by Emperor Leo the Wise, at which time undoubtedly the Emperor composed his stichera for Vespers, "Wishing to behold the tomb of Lazarus . . ."



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Lazarus Saturday April 12

Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary, the friends of the Lord Jesus, had given Him hospitality and served Him many times (Luke 10:38-4z; John 12:2-3). They were from Bethany, a village of Judea. This village is situated in the eastern parts by the foothills of the Mount of Olives, about two Roman miles from Jerusalem, When Lazarus - whose name is a Hellenized form of "Eleazar," which means "God has helped," became ill some days before the saving Passion, his sisters had this report taken to our Saviour, Who was then in Galilee. Nonetheless, He tarried yet two more days until Lazarus died; then He said to His disciples, "Let us go into Judea that I might awake My friend who sleepeth." By this, of course, He meant the deep sleep of death. On arriving at Bethany, He consoled the sisters of Lazarus, who was already four days dead. Jesus groaned in spirit and was troubled at the death of His beloved friend. He asked, "Where have ye laid his body?" and He wept over him. When He drew nigh to the tomb, He commanded that they remove the stone, and He lifted up His eyes, and giving thanks to God the Father, He cried out with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come forth." And he that had been dead four days came forth immediately, bound hand and foot with the grave clothes, and Jesus said to those standing there, "Loose him, and let him go." This is the supernatural wonder wrought by the Saviour that we celebrate on this day.

Starbucks or Church?

Starbucks

Our local Starbucks sells many coffee and tea drinks. For example:

Cappuccino (venti size) \$5.83 including tax Blonde Vanilla Latte (grande size) \$6.37 including tax

If we bought one of these two drinks each day, our average cost would be \$6.10 per day.

Church

Let's compare this to the operating cost of our Church:

Church Daily Cost* \$6.09 (tax-free!)

Conclusion

It costs almost an identical daily amount to have our beautiful Church or a Starbucks drink!

If our stewards could contribute this amount per day on average, we would not only balance our budget, but we would have a surplus due to other income like interest, candles and our festival.

Food for thought!

Based on 2025 Budget, Total Expenses divided by 151 stewards and 365 days per year.

Includes cost for our priest, contracted personnel, building maintenance, utilities, insurance, Archdiocese etc.

Excludes capital & special projects, other expenses, planned giving.
