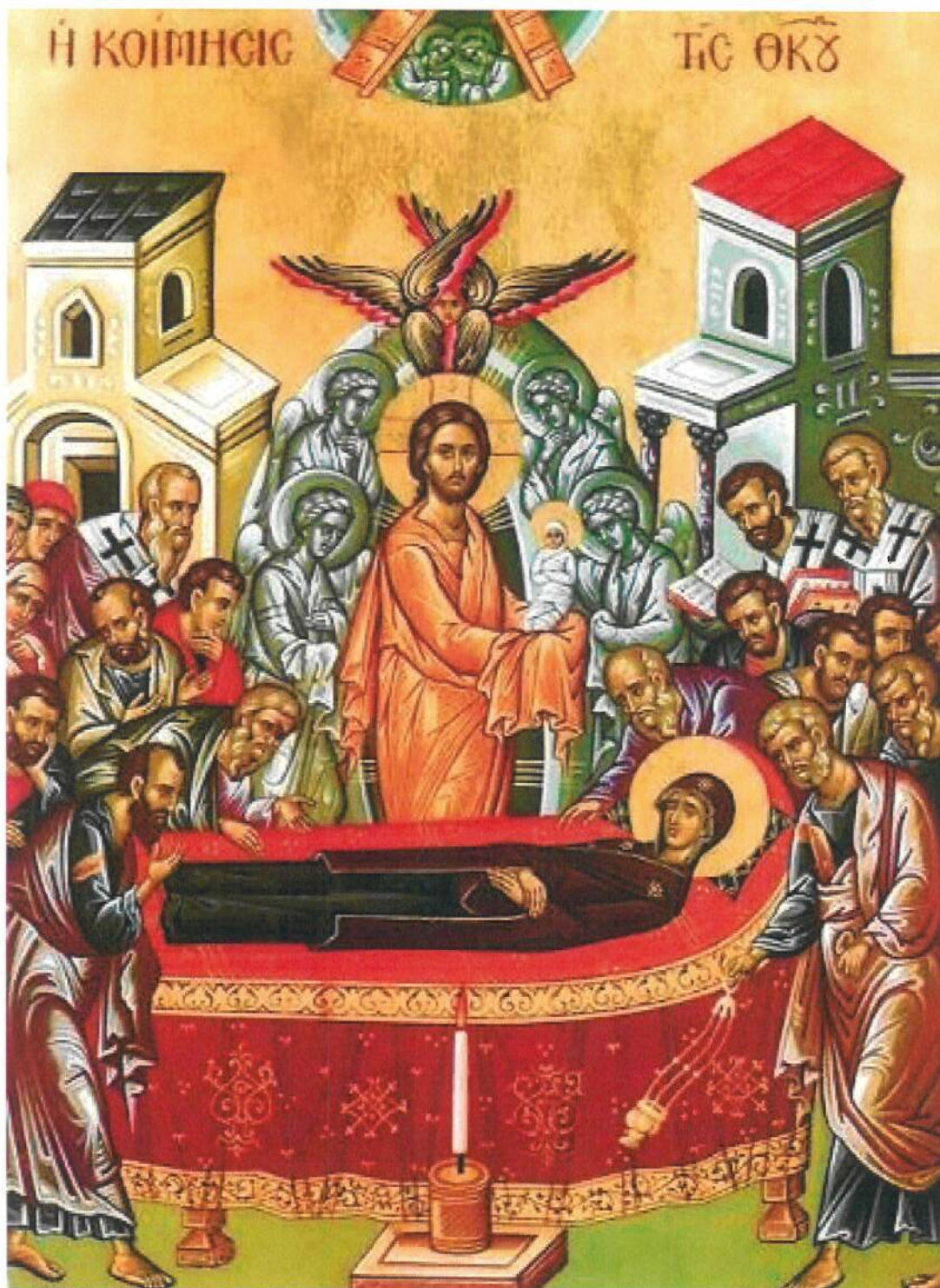

Our Life of Worship

The Early Church was characterized by the fact that its members were primarily a worshipping community. Whatever sprang from the life of the Early Church was the direct result of its devotion to God and its effort to do His will.

Collective worship, therefore, was an essential part of everyone's life in the Early Church. It bound each individual to the worshipping community. In short, collective worship defined each person's "Christian identity." We recognize the importance of collective worship to our life today. Here, at Saint Nicholas, we are a worshipping community. This means that just as the Holy Spirit affected the mind and heart of the Early Church, it affects our 21st century Church life. As a community we move towards God in our worship together.

We should be increasingly concerned with our participation. We should seek to understand the real reasons why Christians have been gathering and worshipping together for centuries. We must address some of the shallow excuses that we sometimes use to avoid worship with our church family. Recognize that occasional attendance on Sundays reflects our less than faithful commitment to Jesus Christ.

Just as we quickly seek to repair an unreliable appliance, so we must seek to improve our participation in worship. The solution is simple: ask questions and participate frequently. For just as a reliable refrigerator can make a difference, just as a reliable car is a necessity, so too can interest and participation make a difference in our individual and collective spiritual development.

August first we enter into the fifteen day period of Dekapentavgousto, the special lent devoted to the Theotokos, the Holy Mother of God. On August 15 we celebrate her Dormition, falling asleep in the Lord. During the fourteen days preceding we fast and offer special prayers, Paraklesis -- Supplication services, to the Theotokos. Within this brief lenten season, on August 6, we also celebrate the Transfiguration of our Lord. Both are major feast days in the life of our Greek Orthodox Church.

I urge you to make the commitment to participate in the central part of our Church, its prayer life, and worship with us during the special Paraklesis services, Great Vespers, and Divine Liturgy of Dekapentavgous-to.

We ask all students to bring their backpacks to church on Sunday, August 9, for the blessing of the backpacks. Public school begins the next day. Ministry sign-up for the upcoming new ecclesiastical year will be on August 30 and September 6. Lead your children to Christ: don't allow them to languish without God in their lives. Their direction in life rests entirely on all those who are involved with them: parents, godparents, grandparents, uncles, and aunts.



Dormition of the Theotokos (August 15)

Concerning the Dormition of the Theotokos, this is what the Church has received from ancient times from the tradition of the Fathers. When the time drew nigh that our Savior was well-pleased to take His Mother to Himself, He declared unto her through an Angel that three days hence, He would translate her from this temporal life to eternity and bliss. On hearing this, she went up with haste to the Mount of Olives, where she prayed continuously. Giving thanks to God, she returned to her house and prepared whatever was necessary for her burial. While these things were taking place, clouds caught up the Apostles from the ends of the earth, where each one happened to be preaching, and brought them at once to the house of the Mother of God, who informed them of the cause of their sudden gathering. As a mother, she consoled them in their affliction as was meet, and then raised her hands to Heaven and prayed for the peace of the world. She blessed the Apostles, and, reclining upon her bed with seemliness, gave up her all-holy spirit into the hands of her Son and God.

With reverence and many lights, and chanting burial hymns, the Apostles took up that God-receiving body and brought it to the sepulchre, while the Angels from Heaven chanted with them, and sent forth her who is higher than the Cherubim. But one Jew, moved by malice, audaciously stretched forth his hand upon the bed and immediately received from

divine judgment the wages of his audacity. Those daring hands were severed by an invisible blow. But when he repented and asked forgiveness, his hands were restored. When they had reached the place called Gethsemane, they buried there with honor the all-immaculate body of the Theotokos, which was the source of Life. But on the third day after the burial, when they were eating together, and raised up the artos (bread) in Jesus' Name, as was their custom, the Theotokos appeared in the air, saying "Rejoice" to them. From this they learned concerning the bodily translation of the Theotokos into the Heavens.

These things has the Church received from the traditions of the Fathers, who have composed many hymns out of reverence, to the glory of the Mother of our God (see Oct. 3 and 4)

Apolytikion of Dormition of the Theotokos

First Tone

In birth, you preserved your virginity; in death, you did not abandon the world, O Theotokos. As mother of life, you departed to the source of life, delivering our souls from death by your intercessions.

Kontakion of Dormition of the Theotokos

Second Tone

Neither the grave nor death could contain the Theotokos, the unshakable hope, ever vigilant in intercession and protection. As Mother of life, He who dwelt in the ever-virginal womb transposed her to life.

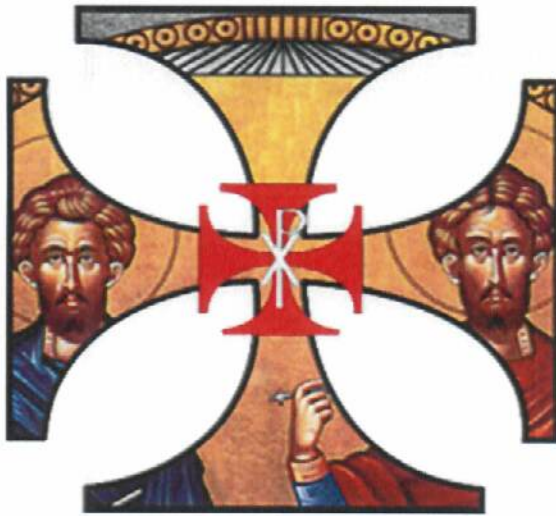

How can we judge people for their choices when we know nothing about their options?

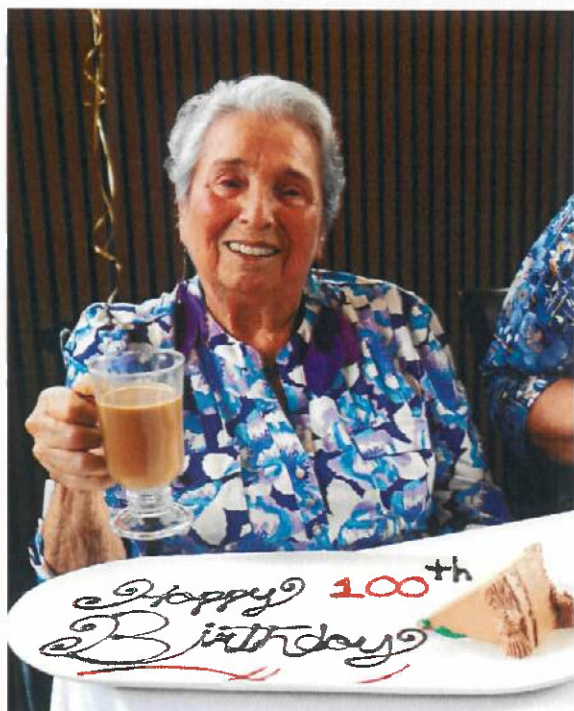
It stayed in my mind for a while. Because from the outside, it's always easy to point at someone's life and say they chose wrong.
